



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

THE IMPACT OF THE TRADE ENVIRONMENT ON WOMEN'S EMPLOYMENT

Friday, 17 March 2017, 11.30 a.m. – 12.45 p.m.

There are various channels of interaction through which the trade environment affects women's employment. Take openness could induce changes in the structure of production, for export or domestic purposes. This, in turn, could cause changes in the level and distribution of employment of different categories of workers, including men and vomen, as well as in their remuneration. Women may simultaneously gain and lose from trade depending on their role in the economy as consumers.




